SACE Merit Award Ceremony

On Tuesday 8 February students who received a perfect score of 20 in any SACE subject in 2010, were invited to Government House.

Jordan was acknowledged for his two 20's. He



was congratulated by his Psychology teacher, Ms Giles too.

SACE Results

One of the important aspects of schools is the achievements after twelve years of schooling. The Year 12 Class of 2010 achieved sound academic results. Dux for 2010 was Jordan Tutton who achieved an Australian Tertiary Achievement Rank (ATAR formerly called Tertiary Entrance Rank TER) of 99.15. Jordan achieved five As including two perfect scores of 20 for Psychology and Legal Studies. His other As were achieved in English Studies, Modern History and Philosophy.

There was a total of five students including Jordan who achieved an ATAR above 95:

- ◆ Jordan with five As and an ATAR of 98.45. Jordan received As in Drama Studies, English Studies, Legal Studies, Philosophy and Psychology. He will undertake Hons in Law and Legal Practice, plus Behavioural Science at Flinders Uni.



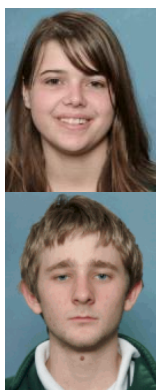
- ◆ Deborah with three As and an ATAR of 95.95. She received A's for Psychology, Early Childhood Studies and Visual Arts. She has an option of a Bachelor of Applied Science, Occupational Therapy at Uni SA, which she has deferred for 12 months.

- ◆ Meghan with four As and an ATAR of 95.25. Her A's were in Biology, Philosophy, Psychology and Mathematical Methods. She will undertake a Law Double Degree at Uni SA.
- ◆ Callum with four A's and an ATAR of 95. Callum's As were in Biology, English Studies, Legal Studies and Philosophy. He will undertake a Commerce & Law Double Degree at Uni SA.



For 2010 the following results were achieved:

- 117 students completed their SACE. This represents a 94% SACE completion rate.
- 100% of students who completed the SACE had a TAFE selection score.
- 5.2% of the students achieved an ATAR of 95 or above.
- 13.3% of the students achieved an ATAR of 90 or above.
- 16/7% of the students achieved an ATAR of 80 to 89.99.
- 22.9% of the students achieved an ATAR of 70 to 79.99.
- 48.7% of the students achieved at least one 'A' grade.
- 84.9% of the total grades achieved were a 'C' or higher.
- 95.7% of all students who applied for a tertiary entrance received an offer.

The class of 2010 are to be congratulated on their achievements. I would like to thank the Year 12 teachers for their dedication and commitment in working with the Year 12 students in 2010.

School uniform serves to:

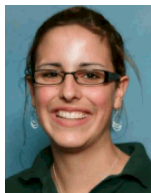
- develop a sense of belonging and school identity

MATHEMATICS RESULTS & INFORMATION

COMPETITIONS: Blackwood High runs lots of exciting Mathematics Competitions and activities for students. Early this term we will be entering students in The Maths Challenge and Enrichment Stages Competition, the Australian Information Competition and the Australian mathematics Competition all run by the Australian Mathematics Trust. These competitions are challenging and are aimed at students who have achieved at a high level in the past. In addition we want students to enter the Australian Statistics Poster Competition run by the Australian Bureau of Statistics and the Sharemarket Game run by the ASX.

Year 8 students, in conjunction with our Cluster primary schools, can participate over five Fridays in the Maths Olympiads. Each Olympiad has 5 questions that require thinking skills and logic to solve. We also run weekly Challenge Questions for Year 8 students that help provide them with a background to entering other competitions.

Please encourage your son/daughter to participate in the above competitions and activities if they have shown interest in Mathematics or in Engineering as a career.

PARKING AT BLACKWOOD HS

Included with this newsletter is a leaflet from the City of Mitcham regarding safety around schools, road rules, speed limits and parking. The Mitcham Council may fine parents if they contravene the Council by-laws explained in the pamphlet. In particular **the Council has directed that parents are not use the Recreation Centre car park to drop off and pick up children coming to and from school.** In the interest of student safety the staff car park is not to be used.

The school bus lane is also unsafe for cars when buses are arriving and leaving, and while school is on. We ask that parents do not drive through the school at all while bringing children to and from school. Instead, please drop them off on Shepherds Hill Road, west of Seymour Street, or Northcote Road near the fire station, or at the back of the school on Beaconsfield Road.

For evening parent meetings or events you are asked to use the Staff car park and Busway (not the Recreation Centre car park).

WORLD CHALLENGE – Successful fundraiser



With a planning day on Monday 17 and an early start on Saturday 22 January 2011, Blackwood High School's two World Challenge teams started preparations to feed 2000 people at a BBQ fundraiser at Willunga Hill for the Tour Down Under.

Some of the team met at the school at 6am to load the BBQ, signs and collect the meat, while others drove to Willunga to beat the road blocks and start the set up of our location.

We had a perfect position out the front of the Library, right next to the road where the race would go past a number of times. The only problem first thing in the morning was the wind and how we were going to keep the shade tent from blowing away.

After some smart rope tying and trailer anchoring. We had a great stall for selling sausages, steak sandwiches, drinks and killer pythons.

Approximately 20 students from the two teams gave up their whole Saturday to raise money for our community project in Borneo, which will occur later this year in November. They showed dedication, enthusiasm, teamwork, leadership and initiative to make sure the event was successful.

Team members organised themselves with the roles they would carry out for the day. Some cooked the BBQ, others cut onions, some walked around the crowd with eskys selling drinks, others handled the money and order taking. Overall the group showed the skill they will need to exhibit while we are away for 4 weeks, and sold approximately 450 steak sandwiches and 1200 sausages. The BBQ was extremely popular as the team was run off its feet from 9.30am-2.30pm and we were able to raise approximately \$3000 after expenses.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Many of the VET courses offered across our region have started this week, with others to commence shortly. Families should have received a letter confirming places during the holidays. If you are unsure of dates and times, please call the school to check any details.

At this time there are a few key factors for students and families to be aware of:

1. Once enrolled, a student has made a commitment to complete and pay for the course. Providers will not refund fees for students who choose to 'drop-out' midway through their training.
2. Like school, there is the expectation that students arrive to their courses on time and in correct attire. If

absent for any reason, families must inform both the training provider and the school as early as possible that day.

3. Many students will miss at least one day of school per week. It is essential that teachers are made aware of this and an alternative is negotiated. Students affected have been issued with a letter outlining their responsibilities to be signed by both the teacher and a parent or caregiver.

Completing a VET course can be a rewarding and career defining experience. The keys to success are:

- Set Goals – for school, training and life that are attainable (both short and long term)
- Be Organised – know when assignments are due and start work on them early.
- Communicate – with teachers, trainers and your parents. It will help us to help you!
- Ask for Help – before problems become too large. This will help us to find a solution together.

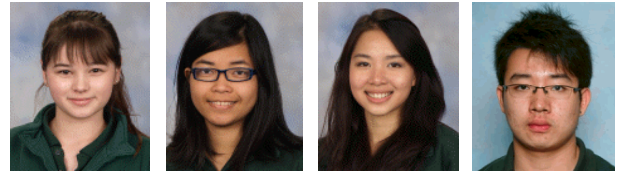
