Subject Selections for study in 2024

On Tuesday 4 July, our Creativity Centre will host students across year 7 to year 11, engaging with teachers and leaders in presentations around subject offerings for 2024; our Curriculum Expo. The Expo is designed to be a snapshot of the possible choices that students have across our eight learning areas. Each year level has a range of choices that can be made, increasing in number from year 7s choosing electives, through to year 11s choosing from a suite of offerings to study in year 12.


Curriculum Leaders, or targeted members of their faculty areas, will present quick overviews for the choices that students can make; this is the start of our subject selection process. We hope that this information will spark students curiosity and we encourage you to sit with them and discuss potential choices, using our Curriculum Prospectus to support you in your conversations. The prospectus is available to view and download from our website - https://www.bhs.sa.edu.au/curriculum/curriculum-prospectus/.

Within the prospectus, you will find overview pages that summarise the subjects available within a given year level. These pages outline the compulsory and elective options for students to choose. Families should browse and read up about the subjects themselves to ensure that students are aware of the requirements within each subject. For example, if your child is in year 8 in 2023, then you should look at the year 9 information page and read through the subject offerings at a year 9 level, for 2024.

At the start of Term 3, you will receive a range of information that will enable you and your child to make selections for their study in 2024. Some students may be asked to meet with a leader to discuss subject pathways and eligibility, this will be communicated with the families that require it. All year 10 and year 11 students will be required to meet with a subject counsellor to review their decisions and ensure that they have made appropriate selections for their preferred pathway(s).

All students and families are encouraged to think carefully about subject choices and how these may align to future pathways. Students are encouraged to have conversations with their subject and/or care group teacher(s) to enable them to make an informed decision about their future study options. The final subject offerings and timetable for 2024 is based on the decisions that students submit next term. Although every effort is made to meet students' preferred choices, this will be possible only within the school's capacity to provide the required teachers and to form viable classes.



ANZAC Day School's Award

Year 10 Blackwood High School student, Megan Bryant, has done an incredible job in engaging in self-directed research and learning related to the commemoration of Vietnam War service.

In late term 2, Blackwood High School students had the opportunity to travel to Canberra to visit nationally significant sites, including the National War Memorial, and participation in this trip catalysed Megan's interest in both the commemoration of war service and the ANZAC Day School Awards.

Reviewing the criteria, Megan chose to research a number of different

Vietnam Veterans in order to create a museum-style display. She came up with the idea to present the information by using the school's laser cutters to engrave the information onto MDF board. In order to achieve her outcome, she carefully selected veterans to research, undertook research and interviews, selected appropriate quotations, learned to operate the laser cutters, and mounted her results and the loaned medals awarded to 'Rusty' Russack. Thank you to staff member, Hamish Russack, for loaning us his

father's medals. Her work will be displayed in the school's awards cabinet so it can be shared with the school and community.

Megan will be able to continue her project later in the year where she will have the opportunity to visit the War Memorial and ANZAC Parade, expanding on her already significant understanding of the importance and modes of memorialisation in Australia. She will also be involved in the Remembrance Day Ceremony, to be held around November 11. Megan will deliver a presentation to the school of 1160 students where she will share her research and insights.

Blackwood High School looks forward to seeing how Megan's project impacts the knowledge and understanding of students, staff, and the community through her engagement with research, producing an outcome, public speaking, and reflection.


Dynamically Sensational String Workshop

Resource Centre Loans Policy

Blackwood High School's Resource Centre aims to provide resources that encourage reading for pleasure, and information and resources to support student learning. To do this, it needs to have resources available to Resource Centre users, including a broad range of novels, non-fiction resources and a sufficient number of textbooks on hand for classes as required.

General Resource Centre items are available for loan for up to three weeks, after which a student will receive an overdue reminder notice via email. Textbooks are lent for the duration of the subject, usually either a semester or one school year (February to November/December depending on year level). Loan laptops and all accessories should be returned after three weeks or when the student's own laptop is repaired or replaced, whichever is sooner.

The school-issued student card is also the student's borrowing card, and students are required to present it when borrowing any item from the Resource Centre, and students are responsible for the return in good condition of any items borrowed in their name. It is expected that students return all items by the due date or prior to leaving the school.

Resource Centre staff are in the process of sending out invoices to cover the replacement cost of any items borrowed in 2022 or earlier and not returned. However, our preference is for the items to be found and returned to the Resource Centre. To avoid paying for the replacement of borrowed items, please encourage your child to look for any outstanding items and promptly return them to the Resource Centre.

Middle School Update

Year 7 Update

Back in week 1, the Year 7 students were introduced to the Zootopia Unit. The students were asked to pick an animal that they would spend the term researching. Week 2 was the excursion to the Adelaide Zoo, where the students observed their chosen animal and filled out a small booklet about the animal's environment. Throughout the term the students had to complete tasks in the online booklet for the unit, which consisted of learning material for both Maths and Science. Some of the tasks directly related to Maths and Science concepts, most notably were the shape animal task where students drew their animal with shapes and found the area of them, and the two dichotomous (classification) keys of shapes and animals including their chosen animal.

All of those things led up to the main assignment for the last few weeks of the term; the enclosure model. The students used their prior knowledge of their chosen zoo animal to create an enclosure model where their animal can survive and thrive, taking into account the features of a real enclosure, such as viewing spots, staff entry and water bodies. Alongside the enclosure, they also had to create an infographic to grab the attention of the observer with eye-catching features such as a huge picture of their animal, and small facts about it. Throughout this task, the Year 7s demonstrated many skills and enjoyed the project.



In addition to being part of Learning and Assessment Plans, these exams help prepare Year 11s for the atmosphere and environment that will come with at the end of Year 12 and into tertiary studies. Students were highly professional and undertook these in an extremely organised and respectful fashion. Well done Year 11s!

Week 8 saw over 60 Year 10 students go out on Work Experience into the community. Students explored a wide range of workplaces from agricultural settings, trades and medical research. Work Experience is an amazing opportunity to investigate potential careers and get a taste of what life-after-school might look like. Often these lead to students having a clear idea of their post-school pathway and can result in higher engagement and achievement moving forward. For those students who missed out this time or want to try work experience in other areas please speak with the Senior School team as we are always happy to support these endeavours.

This week both Year 10 and 11 have engaged with the Sammy D Foundation's violence prevention presentations. These presentations explore the story of Sammy Davis, whose life was tragically cut short after becoming a victim of a coward punch in 2008. Students heard from Sammy's dad about the impact youth violence can have on people, families and whole communities, and how we can all make a difference by saying NO to

violence. Whilst at times confronting, there was overwhelming respect felt by all, with Sammy's story resonating strongly. Feedback from students was very positive – a very worthwhile presentation.

The Learning Cultures Student Leadership Group and Mr Lachlan McFarlane have developed some outstanding planning tools to support senior students make effective use of their independent study time. These will be used in senior study to support the development of the long-lasting independent learning skills we know are vital to success both at school and in life. These evidence-based 'Strategies for Students to Achieve Excellence' are part of a whole-school focus on 'Effective Learning Strategies' which teachers have been trialling and incorporating in classes, particularly in the senior school. We hope these promote a positive working environment and will be a focus in the senior school into Semester 2 and beyond. If parents can encourage students to complete a planning slip before they start an independent study session at home this will support them to develop good learning habits.




Learning Cultures Student Leadership Strategies for Students to Achieve Excellence

Canberra

41 students and 6 staff left for Canberra by bus early Monday morning (week 8). We managed to pick up another of our students during our trip. The itinerary was packed full of places to see and things to do, from star gazing to making a glass tile. We learnt about our Constitution and our political system, and many hands-on role plays and workshops kept our students and staff busy. 42 weary students and 6 tired staff members rolled back into Adelaide the following Saturday morning having had an extraordinary and unforgettable time in our nation's capital.

Onw od hw first places we visited was the National Capital Authority Exhibition and it was a great place to start our week. We learnt about the Story of Canberra as the capital city of Australia, its unique design and the importance of landscape. It was fascinating to discover the history of the International Design competition held in 1912 and find out about the husband and wife team behind the design, Walter Burley Griffin and Marion Mahoney Griffin. At the heart of the Griffin plan is a great triangle with each corner representing a key aspect of a strong democracy. Today the Triangle is the site of public parks, green spaces, key government buildings and



national institutions, many of which we experienced in the coming days.

The guided tour at Parliament House was a great experience to both learn about and understand more about Parliament House. The guided tour provided an insight into how the Senate and House of Representatives function, as we were given the opportunity to view them in action through a viewing gallery. We were also able to participate in a role play of the House of Representatives, playing multiple roles within it, and learning what their purpose is and how a bill can be passed. Overall, the guided tour was a very fun yet interesting experience, teaching us about how the Parliament functions.



The MOAD (Museum of Australian Democracy) was the first Parliament House in Australia and was active from 1927-1988. It is located just underneath Parliament House in the Triangle formation. There we learned about 'The Dismissal'; in 1975, Governor-General, Sir John Kerr met with Prime Minister Gough Whitlam, and withdrew Whitlan's position as Prime Minister. The Governor-General then called upon the deputy Prime Minister to establish a Caretaker Government. During our visit in the MOAD, our group explored signigicant areas where huge policial discussions and private events occurred through a role play, where students acted out three key figures; Gough Whitlan, Malcom Fraser, and Sir John Kerr. We saw the Senate, the Cabinet Room, the Prime Minister's office, and various other locations.

We all went to the Glass Works Canberra. The Glass Works factory



was originally a coal factory that was built May 2007. This factory helped to collect and store the coal that had been mined. Inside



this building there are lots of meaningful pieces of art that all have deep stories behind them. This helped us as a group understand what the artist was trying to represent and get out of this art work. During our visit we split into two septate groups and did different things. One group went and did glasswork, while the other group got a tour of the factory. We were able to experiment and create small glass tiles by cutting and shaping smaller pieces of glass. Once we had created our tile or finished our tour we swapped with the other group and did the second activity. This was a very interesting and cool experience that most students would love to do

again.

From the second we walked through the gates of the Deep Space Communication Centre, we were engaged with the science of the technology around us. Students were able to experience democracy at work on our visit to the Australian Electoral Commission. After learning about the history of democracy in Australia including male suffrage post Gold Rush in Victoria and women obtaining the right to vote in South Australia in 1894, students conducted a mock vote in the House of Representatives and the Senate. Students learnt how to elect the party of their choice in the House of Reps, above the line and below the line voting in the Senate, and saw the preferential system at work. Interestingly the Home Cooking Party was a clear favourite over the Fast Food Party!


Year 12 PARTY Safe Health Program

Homestay Families for International Students

Prior to COVID 19, Blackwood High School hosted more than 90 International Students each year from China, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Brazil, Japan, Korea, Germany, Philippines, Switzerland, Vietnam, Thailand, Italy, Hungary and France, and 40 short term students from Japan for two weeks. This year, we are set to welcome 70 International students from a range of countries, into the Blackwood High School learning community

International students come to South Australia for various lengths of time, ranging from a short term stay of two to six weeks to longer programs from one to five years. Many of the longer-term students come to South Australia with the aim of completing their secondary education and then continuing with tertiary study.

Central to the success of International Student programs in South Australia are homestay families. At Blackwood High School we are dependent on the generosity of families in our school community to provide homestays for International Students studying at our school. We are always looking for families interested in opening their homes to students from overseas, with a homestay fee of \$300 per week being paid to host an international student.
