From the Principal

a continued focus on pro-active student support and high academic expectations. In addition, there has been a plethora of programmes and activities beyond the classroom including Athletics Day, several Outdoor Education camps, Year 7 Pool Day, International Students Fleurieu Excursion, Year 8 Camp, to name a few. The Year 7 cohorts have been fully inducted into Blackwood High School (BHS) life and, overall, their term 1 achievement data is very pleasing. At the top end of the school, our Year 12s are also off to a good start in what is their final and most challenging school year. The Year 12 Formal was highly successful, with almost 100 percent of students in attendance and looking absolutely fabulous! With that event behind them, the reality of the next two and a half terms is Somewhat related to the values is our ongoing setting in, as it really does fly by. Senior years teachers are impressed by the study attitude of this year's cohort and are expecting some impressive 2024 SACE results.

The Student Free Day on 8 March provided an opportunity for the whole staff to come together to review our school vision and values. As identified last year, we felt strongly that the BHS values needed to be revisited and reviewed, so that they become more relevant to our school community while providing a vehicle for consistent and agreed language. Integrating school values into all aspects of life is a proven and effective strategy to guide our young people to succeed at school and into the future. On the day, we used a facilitator Travis Bartlett, who led an extremely engaging process where staff initially reflected on their own memories of schooling and the characteristics of the teachers that they revered. This led to table discussions regarding what students can expect from BHS staff, when they walk through the gates each day. This guided the staff toward the type of values, beliefs and characteristics that we hope to reinforce with students during their time at the school. By the end of the day, we had a huge list of words that we worked to categorise in an attempt

Term 1 has been highly productive and settled with to 'land' on three school values. These were Respect, Responsibility and Resilience which the staff believed could guide both academic and social/emotional success. Other words such as empathy, integrity, caring, collaboration, intrinsic motivation, and many more, were identified, which really highlighted the passionate and committed nature of our teaching and non-teaching staff. The next steps are to consult and unpack the values with students and families, develop some explicit classroom resources that define underlying qualities of the values (Year 7 to 12), and undertake further training as to the consistent implementation and use of language across the school, in and out of the classroom.

> commitment to staff training in Restorative Practices (RP) and Positive Behaviour for Learning. This year we will continue to engage with Kerrie Sellen, a known expert in the Restorative Practices, to build the capacity of staff to sequentially work through conversations with students. Both the RP trainings and our Classroom Behaviour Guide dovetail nicely with our new values and these will be consistently present in meetings and documentation/resources, soon to be updated.

The school's 2024 Site Improvement Plan is in its final draft form and will be presented at Governing Council this week for ratification. As previously mentioned, as the Chief Executive has developed the new strategy for education across the state, schools can choose to base their SIP on Literacy/Numeracy improvement and/or any of the new Areas for Impact (Wellbeing, Effective Learners, Student Agency or Equity and Excellence). BHS has chosen to continue Goal 1 with our focus on Learner Achievement, while Goal 2 will relate to student wellbeing and school belonging, both underpinned by inculcating the school values into the SIP.

Finally, this year we are attempting to ramp up our communication particularly through regular updates of the Blackwood High School Facebook page. It contains a range of information, good news stories, events and activities and we hope that it gives you a valuable insight into our school culture. Term 1 Report Distribution and Learning Progress Conversations

Thursday 4 April 2024: Report Distribution

In 2024, we once again look forward to hosting our Student Learning Progress Conversations in the Creativity Centre. These conversations are a critical part of students' learning journey at Blackwood High School and enable you and your child meet with their teachers to discuss learning engagement, growth, challenges and successes in their learning.

Summary Term 1 reports are distributed during a special Care Group at the end of Thursday 4 April. These provide families with a summary of their student's achievement for the first half of semester 1. Students studying subjects across Year 7 to Year 10 are resulted against the Australian Curriculum using an A to E grading system. Students studying subjects at a Year 11 or Year 12 level are being resulted using an A+ to E-grading system, providing students and families with a more accurate reflection of their current achievement progress, previously Year 11 subjects were A to E only. A range of indicators and attendance information is also included on these reports. A detailed description of the levels of achievement is included on the back of the report, to provide families with further clarification.

For the last few years, all reports have been published in DayMap for direct parent access; saved and downloadable throughout the entirety of a student's enrolment at BHS. In 2024, Term 1 will be the last time that we print hard copy reports for all students. All future reports will be distributed electronically to families. Any family that needs to receive a printed copy is asked to notify the school.





Year 7 Anti-bullying Assembly

The Year 7 students participated in an Anti-bullying assembly in Week 8's extended Pastoral Care lesson. The assembly was presented by Ms Buenel, our Wellbeing Leader and the Senior BHS Student Wellbeing Ambassadors.

The presentation included the Year 7 students watching our BHS created 'Stand Against Bullying Video', learning about What is Bullying?, and understanding what a bystander is and learning about 'The Bystander Effect'.

Information shared by the older students included:

- Bystanders are the largest group of people involved in violence. They are not directly involved but can be almost bad as the bully. They know violence is occurring or see it happen.
- Bystanders can be an active bystander by choosing to intervene (if it is safe for them to do so) or be a passive bystander who stands back and does nothing to help.

Year 7 student will continue to unpack the Bystander and Anti-bullying concepts in pastoral care lessons over the next few weeks. A big thank you to Ms Buenel and the Student Wellbeing Ambassadors for the assembly and follow up lessons.

Senior Years Update continued

Year 11

The Year 11 students have been involved in many in class curricular activities throughout the term. Having a range of new subjects offered to them this year, they have been able to explore learning opportunities outside the classroom. Students have attended fringe performances in Arts, Dance, Drama and English and Outdoor Education excursions. From these events, students gain the knowledge of transferable skills learnt at school into the community.

The Pastoral Care lessons this term have provided students with the chance to explore their interests in future careers. This will provide them with the bases for subject selection moving forward into Stage 2. The Road Awareness Presentation (RAP) was conducted in week 9 to all Year 11 students. During the presentation, firefighters shared their personal experiences, with a focus on ways in which people are affected by road trauma and how a young person's life may change following a motor vehicle crash. The highlight of the program is the guest speaker: a real-life crash survivor who talked to the students about their ordeal. Through sharing their story, they made an impassioned plea for students to learn from their mistakes.


The messaged conveyed during the presentation is at a timely point in a young persons life when students are either learning to drive or moving to their provisional registration.

Year 10

In Week 8 the Year 10 prefects and myself met with the Year 10 cohort to discuss the SACE Learner Profile concept of "collective engagement". All students will have an opportunity to build evidence towards this capability this year. The prefects ran an activity with all students to model examples and identify positive behaviours that students are focussing on. These behaviours will contribute to an improved collective engagement capability when they have the chance to reflect later in the semester.

In Week 7, Darren from Get Home Safe foundation visit Blackwood High School to work with our Year 10 students. As part of it, a volunteer student used VR goggles in an actual car using the brake pedals and steering wheel with sensors input into a simulator. This helped our students understand what's involved with "positive driving" and that the speed limit isn't a "speed target". Darren also spoke to parents in an evening session about how to support their soon-to-be learner drivers in their households.

"I was lucky enough to be picked out of my group to put on the VR headset and experience driving a car for the



first time. It was an enjoyable experience. It helped me feel what it is like to be behind the wheel in tricky situations like pedestrians coming out of nowhere and other cars on the road changing lanes in front of me. My strategy was to stay slow and aware, and follow the signs. This meant I didn't have an accident except I couldn't resist testing out the simulator by crashing on purpose at the end. It was a great session and I recommend students attend again when it is on offer."

The Year 10 and SACE dance students attended the performance of Jungle Book at the Festival Theatre. Choreographed by Akram Khan, this new work is based on the much-loved story by Rudyard Kipling.

Khan has reinterpreted this story through the eyes of a young climate refugee who has been driven from her homeland and arrives alone in a deserted modern city. Jungle Book reimagined follows the journey of Mowgli as she makes unlikely friends in this strange kind of jungle where wild animals claim the streets as their own. Entertaining, inventive and accessible, with an important message at its core.

Jungle Book reimagined powerfully blends dance with theatrical and digital elements, including state-of-the-art animation and a specially commissioned score, to bring this story to life. Jungle Book reimagined reminds us of the need to respect our natural world and invites us to reimagine a different future.

INTRODUCING THE SVA SERVICE AWARD PROGRAM

Helping volunteers gain acknowledgement for the work they do

Blackwood High School is one of eight schools participating in the SVA Service Award Pilot Program. Through the SVA Service Award, students will be able to demonstrate their volunteering experience when applying for jobs, apprenticeships, scholarships, and further study through a new app being piloted in South Australian schools. There is no cost for students in our school to participate. Students can count up to 60 SACE credits of Community Learning at Stage 1.

The program began in New Zealand following the Christchurch earthquakes in 2010, where 11,000 students came together to help with recovery efforts. Through the SVA Service Award, students will be able to demonstrate their volunteering experience when applying for jobs, apprenticeships, scholarships, and further study through a new app being piloted in South Australian schools.

The South Australian SVA Service Award pilot focuses on secondary school students and uses an easy-to-use app to track and celebrate voluntary service with badges and resume-ready summaries.

More than 470 South Australian students have signed up to the pilot, with almost 120 students already actively volunteering - logging over 3000 volunteering hours through the program to date.

Students can log their volunteer hours and celebrate milestones by achieving Member, Bronze, Silver and Gold badges. They can download a Summary of Service, which is designed as a document that can be used in job interviews and other selection processes, such as apprenticeships, scholarships, and further study.

Students can also reflect on the impact of their volunteering, connecting their efforts to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals – a global initiative to end poverty and protect the planet.





